

- ConsentConsent for EvConsent for Evaluations: Your child may not be tested for a behaviora emotional evaluation without your informed written consent.
- AffirmationAffirmation or Disavowal of Beliefs: A pupil may not be compelled to affirm or A pupil m anyany particular personally or privately held world view, religious doctrine or political opinion.opinion. This law does not relieve pupils of any oopinion. This law does not relieve classroom assignments.
