EASTBOURNE CONTINENCE **CARE TEAM**

MR MARK MALAK & TEAM East Sussex Hospitals NHS Trust

About 27 per cent of the population in the East Sussex Hospitals NHS Trust's catchment area are over 65 - far above the national level of 17 to 18 per cent - giving rise to a higher than average prevalence of incontinence. But when Mr Mark Malak joined the gynaecology department in 1995 there was no dedicated continence service, no protocol for the case of women with continence problems, no physiotherapy input and no guidance for GPs on initial management and referral.

The first step was to establish a dedicated service for all women with continence problems, and a protocol based on national and international guidelines. 'Then I had to develop good communications between the new unit and other people concerned with continence management such as urologists, colorectal surgeons and the geriatric service. I then established a protocol for initial management of incontinence by GPs, showing when they needed to refer patients to us.

Next, Mr Malak started to build up his multidisciplinary team, including a senior physiotherapist and a GP who helped to raise awareness of continence management in primary care. All members of the team are now available at a one-stop clinic.


Education is a key issue, with local fectures, a website and regular scientific updates for GPs and nurses in the community. Junior doctors come to us with no service commitments, so they can learn about what we do."

Achievements

Mr Mark Malak and his team from East Sussex Hospitals NHS Trust have been shortlisted for the continence care category of this year's Hospital Doctor Awards. The team has created a one-stop clinic staffed by a multidisciplinary team including a senior physiotherapists and GP. It has also provided up-to-date information and guidance for GPs in management and referral of women with incontinence plus education for junior doctors. A DGH team which offers a unique one-stop clinic for women with urinary

incontinence has been nominated for one of the most prestigious hospital

awards.

The ten-strong team is thrilled to be one of three nominees up for nomination for a new Hospital Doctor award - The Continence Care Team of the Year award.

Mark Malak, team leader and consultant obstetrician, said, 'I'm absolutely thrilled for the team and this is fantastic news especially this is the first time this award has been presented, it's an honour to be in the top three in the country.

'We have a one-stop incontinence clinic, amongst other clinics, where patients come in to see me and the physiotherapist at the same time.

'We see around 30 patients in this clinic once a week and we've observed through a recent audit that 70 to 83 per cent of patients notice satisfactory improvements after the physiotherapy treatment and will not require

further appointments.

'It's a real team effort which makes the system work efficiently and effectively."

Patients are referred to the clinic by their GP - and even before their first appointment with Mr Malak, the team sends information on incontinence and the clinic they will attend.

More than 27 per cent of the Eastbourne population are of 65 years age or over, compared to a national average of 18 per cent explaining the associated incidence continence problems in the

As well as the important role of nursing and admin staff - the team's senior physiotherapist has an essential role, where the role of pelvic floor muscle exercises has been recognised as a treatment for incontinence.

Jane Goudge, senior specialist clinical physiotherapist in Women's Health, said, 'In the past a patient would have to wait six to eight weeks to get a



physiotherapy appointment, but that's not the case with the one-stop clinic.

'This patients way. understand immediately the correct exercises and their benefits.'

The team consists of nine other crucial members -Jane Goudge, senior clinical specialist physiotherapist in Health, Women's Judy Andrews; a clinical nurse specialist in urogynaecology, Alison Grimston, GP and assistant clinical

urogynaecology, Tarek Dabash, staff grade obstetrics and gynaecology, Linda McGee, senior nurse, urodynamic nurse, Claire Owens and Elaine Howe. health care assistants. Andrea Spirou, medical Wendy secretary, and urogynaecology Fletcher, clerk,

The team will attend the Hospital Doctor Awards ceremony which will be held at a London hotel in November, (contributed)
